Research Excellence

Departments

OISE is home to four distinct, yet interrelated departments of academic study within the field of education studies. Through the many programs, specializations and research opportunities available in OISE's departments, students can customize their learning experience.

Applied Psychology and Human Development (APHD)

The Department of Applied Psychology and Human Development offers five programs that focus on basic and applied research in the areas of human development, teaching, special education, educational psychology and clinical and counselling psychology.

The department is committed to shaping the next generation of researchers, scholars, policy makers and practitioners. Faculty members are leaders in their fields with wide-ranging interests and active research programs.

APHD is home to a diverse group of students and plays host to visiting researchers from around the world.

Curriculum, Teaching and Learning (CTL)

The Department of Curriculum, Teaching and Learning is the largest department at OISE and is home to three programs: Curriculum and Pedagogy, Language and Literacies Education, and Teaching.

With a diverse community of faculty and professional practitioners, the department offers a range of courses and programs relating to academic scholarship and professional practice.

Leadership, Higher and Adult Education (LHAE)

The Department of Leadership, Higher and Adult Education offers three programs: Adult Education and Community Development, Educational Leadership and Policy, and Higher Education. The programs focus on education as it occurs at the elementary, secondary, higher and adult education levels.

The department's courses and programs explore relations between different social settings, such as families, workplaces, local communities, and national and international contexts. Themes running through LHAE's research and teaching include equity and social justice, professional education, policy studies, educational leadership and organizations, and adult learning.

Social Justice Education (SJE)

The Department of Social Justice Education offers a multi- and interdisciplinary program that provides students with critical understandings of the social, historical, cultural, political, economic and ethical contexts of education, broadly conceived.

The department is committed to education, with a focus on equity and social justice from a variety of perspectives including history, philosophy, sociology and political science.



Master's Degrees

Master of Education (MEd)

The MEd degrees are ideal for the professional development of those already engaged in a career related to education. These programs offer flexible academic and professional learning opportunities.

Master of Arts (MA)

The MA degrees are suitable for those who wish to pursue advanced study, research and analysis. Students interested in a research career or completing doctoral studies typically undertake MA programs.

Master of Teaching (MT)

The MT degree combines teacher qualification with advanced study of educational theory and the opportunity to conduct research.

Doctoral Degrees

Doctor of Education (EdD)

The EdD degrees are optimal for the professional development of practitioners.

Doctor of Philosophy (PhD)

The PhD degrees are for those wishing to pursue advanced study, conduct original research and contribute to the advancement of knowledge.

Study Options

Full-time Study

Regular full-time course load is normally six half courses* per academic year (fall and winter semester).

Part-time Study

Part-time course load is normally two half courses* per academic year (fall and winter semester).

Flexible-time (PhD Only)

Designed for practicing professionals who can demonstrate that their employment is related to their intended field of study and research interests.

Examples of work activities include consulting, community organizing, self-employment, contractual work or equivalent, and recently retired individuals who maintain professional engagement.

Students must register full-time for the first four years of the flexible-time program, and with departmental approval may be part-time thereafter.

* Half courses: At OISE most courses involve 24 to 36 hours of organized activity, taken over one session (e.g., fall or winter) and are considered to be 'half' courses in the terminology of the University of Toronto.





Teacher Education ATOISE

EACHER EDUCATION HAS BEEN A CENTRAL PART of the academic mission at the University of Toronto since the establishment of the Faculty of Education in 1907. Today, our teacher education programs reflect OISE's and the University of Toronto's institutional priorities and values as well as the Ontario College of Teachers' regulatory *Standards of Practice for the Teaching Profession and the Ethical Standards for the Teaching Profession*, 2008. Seven shared principles, informed by research on best practices in teacher education, underpin both the Master of Teaching (MT) and the Master of Arts in Child Study and Education programs (MA-CSE):

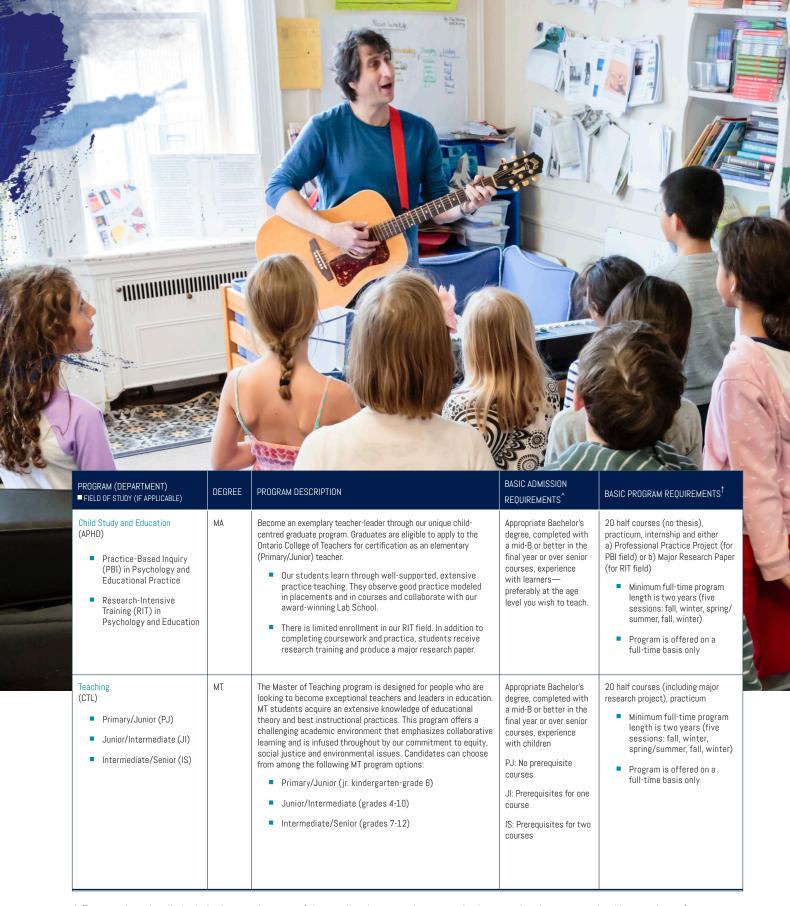

Depending on your program of study, there are a number of sources of support for OISE students

Base Funding Package

OISE offers base funding packages to full-time graduate students in the PhD and non-professional MA programs. This includes students registered in the first year of study in a full-time MA program (excluding the MA in Child Study and Education program) and in the first four years of study in a PhD program (excluding the flexible-time PhD).

Note: Students in the School and Clinical Child Psychology (SCCP) program receive base funding in the first two years of full-time study in the MA program. Those who then apply to and are accepted into the SCCP PhD program will receive base funding for an additional three years of full-time study at the PhD level.

The 2019-2020 base funding package is valued at \$24,850 for domestic students and \$25,486 for international students. This includes tuition and incidental fees and, in the case of international students, single coverage UHIP (University Health Insurance Plan). The base funding package may consist of funds from OISE fellowships, internal or external scholarships and/or employment opportunities.

Founded in 1989, the Indigenous Education Network (IEN) is a group of students, faculty and community members who share a common commitment to and passion for Indigenous education and research. The IEN offers a variety of opportunities and supports for Indigenous students at OISE:

Led by a group of Indigenous and non-Indigenous faculty, students and staff, DKP provides information about the history and traditions of First Nations, Métis, Inuit and Native American cultures. It also educates about the challenges facing Indigenous communities today, and provides curricula for teachers to incorporate this information into teaching practice.

6 I decided to pursue a PhD because I wanted to provide evidence that could lead to life saving solutions and interventions for LGBTQ2S youth. Start your application at www.uoft.me/oiseadmissions

Begin preparing well before the November 15 deadline to ensure your application and supporting documents are ready.

4. Apply via the online admissions application

Enter all required information via the online admissions application (apply.sgs.utoronto.ca) and pay the non-refundable application fee (\$220).

5. Submit supporting documents

Supporting documents include: transcripts, letters of reference, résumé and statement of intent. Some programs have additional required supporting documents.

One single set of supporting documents is required even if you've selected multiple OISE programs.

The document deadline is November 15. If you apply after November 15, the deadline is seven business days after you have completed the online admissions application and must include payment.
